Assessment requirement s:	A practical performance assessment every half term where pupils are given a grade covering their group work contributions and individual drama presentation.
Scheme of work overview:	Year 7s study a variety of devised topics that require them to develop their group work and presentation skills. They will learn the fundamental requirements of what makes a good performance: Projection, focus, levels, audience, tone, expression, and gesture. As the year progresses they will start to learn key theatrical conventions such as freeze frames and how to use them effectively within a performance.

	Year 7 will also study a number of valuable PSHCE topics through drama presentations and performances:

	There will also be a research project into Stanislavsky set at the start of the academic year and also a script writing homework. These project gives pupils the opportunity to show off their independent and creative skills.

Assessment requirement s:	A practical performance assessment every half term where pupils are given a grade covering their group work contributions and individual drama presentation.
Scheme of work overview:	Year 8s study a variety of devised topics that require them to build on the presentation skills they learnt in year 7. They will learn continue to learn the fundamental requirements of what makes a good performance: Projection, focus, levels, audience, tone, expression, and gesture. They will study theatrical conventions such as freeze frames, thought tracks, dream sequences and flash backs and how to use them effectively within a performance.  Pupils will start to add in technical requirements such as sound and lighting and filming where possible.
	Topics include: Mime Brecht Come dine with me World War Two Mask work
	Year 8 will also study a number of valuable PSHCE topics through drama presentations and performances:  Gambling Cyber bullying Too Much Punch for Judy by Mark Wheeler (scripted)  In year 8, some pupils will be introduced to the elements of technical drama which include sound and lighting. These students can then contribute to a group performance through this manner rather than acting.
	There will also be a research project into the practioner Brecht and a script writing homework. These projects give pupils the opportunity to work independently and write a script using a given title or stimulus and then gain an assessment grade through either acting or directing or technical.

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A practical performance assessment every half term where pupils are given a grade covering their group work contributions and individual drama presentation.
Year 9s who have chosen GCSE drama can either opt to take drama as a costume designer, actor or technician (if numbers allow). Pupils start the year by exploring a variety of different practioners and their styles: Stanislavsky, Brecht, Godber, Artaud and Frantic Assembly.
They then move onto learning about theatre roles and other conventions before applying their knowledge to a scripted piece of work: DNA.
The year 9s finish the year by completing a mock Devising Exam where they learn how to develop a drama piece based on a set of stimuli. They perform their pieces at the end of the academic year.
