Child Development promotes a comprehensive understanding of child development. It seeks to equip learners with the knowledge, skills, and awareness necessary to care for and understand children's needs, from infancy through to age five. The curriculum will help learners understand the different stages of child development—physical, emotional, cognitive, and social—and how these impact children's behaviour, learning, and overall well-being.

By the end of the course pupils should

Understand the stages of child development and how they manifest in children's behavior and learning.

Confidently engage with parents, caregivers, and professionals in promoting a child's well-being.

Be prepared for further studies or careers in education, healthcare, or social work that involve children.
